Chief's Report

Response Activity

In January the district responded to 99 calls for service which is slightly higher than the five-year average of 92 incidents for this month. Table 1 outlines the distribution of incidents by incident type series.

January had a higher than usual number of fire incidents with response to four structure fires (three in district and one automatic aid response to Camas) and two chimney fires that were confined to the flue of the chimney.

East County Fire and Rescue members as well as those from Camas Washougal Fire Department, Vancouver Fire Department, and Skamania County Fire District 4 demonstrated a high degree of professionalism while operating at three of the structure fires under difficult conditions with temperatures below 20° F and wind speeds of up to 40 miles per hour.




Figure 1. Incident Responses by Month 2020-2024

Staffing and Deployment

On Thursday, September 14, 2023, Engine, Water Tender, and Squad 94 were relocated to Station 93 for the duration of mold remediation and restoration at Station 94. The duration of this relocation was extended into February due to multiple water pipe breaks in Station 94 due to the extreme cold, wind, and building construction of this district facility. Response from Station 93 resulted in longer response times to fire management zones 94 and 95. Relocation to Station 93 also required dispatch of Engine 43 on high acuity calls in fire management zone 94 even when Station 93 is staffed.





Figure 3. 90th Percentile Shift Staffing and Station 94/93 Availability for Response

During the month of January, the district maintained a 90th percentile¹ shift staffing level of 3 personnel during the day (07:00-19:00) and 2 personnel at night (19:00-07:00). Station 93 was unstaffed 8 times for a full shift (07:00-07:00) and twice during the night (19:00-07:00) during the month to date and as such, the availability of response from this station was 70.97%. Daily shift staffing is illustrated in Figure 2 and Figure 3 illustrates 90th percentile staffing and availability from Station 93.

Figure 2. January Daily Shift Staffing

Four of these incidents were high-acuity, priority two responses (bold text), three of which were handled with an extended response time by resources from Camas Washougal Fire Department.

Shift Reports

A Shift/Training: Training this month has included emergency medical service ongoing training and evaluation on cardiac arrest management, Blue Card on-line training (all members have completed the on-line training and are ready for the certification labs schedule for the first two weeks of February), fireground hydraulics, and end user training for the fire and emergency medical incident reporting component of the ESO records management system.

B Shift/Facilities and Community Risk Reduction: Mold remediation was completed and final finish work on the new kitchen cabinets was completed, but Station 94 experienced multiple broken pipes during the recent period of cold weather. This required removal of all the new kitchen cabinets and opening the kitchen wall to dry this area to prevent future mold growth. A broken pipe behind the wall of the storage room on the east side of the building required considerable effort to locate and this section of the wall was opened to permit repair and will likely require further work to ensure that the structural void behind the wall is dry and will not experience mold growth. Work on this issue is ongoing and we are in the process of filing an insurance claim for the resulting damage. When the east wall was opened there was evidence of previously broken and repaired piping in this section of the building. This is the result of normal cold weather, strong east wind impacting this station, the design of the building (metal building with limited insulation, water piping routed on exterior walls, and open void spaces between the exterior building skin and interior walls).

Captain Sorensen is examining methods that may be able to partially mitigate this issue with the existing building and infrastructure.




Figure 5. Water Pipe Break in the East Wall of Station 94



C Shift/Apparatus and Equipment: The mobile data computer for C91 has been delivered and Captain Prasch is working with CRESA on programming and will coordinate installation with AC Jacobs. Water Tender 91 is back from its annual service with replacement of six drive tires and two steer tires. District apparatus required multiple repairs to valves and gages following the recent period of cold weather and high level of incident activity. All apparatus is currently in service.

Programs and Projects

Grants: There has been a delay in the review of the Department of Ecology Hazmat Grant Applications due to a pipeline spill in Conway, Washington that occurred on December 10, 2023. An update on grant status is expected the week of February 22, 2024.

The Assistance to Firefighter Grant Application process for the current year is open until early March. Staff have been tasked with review of the notice of funding opportunity and funding priorities to identify areas of alignment with the district's mission, strategic plan, and needs. Upon completion of this review Captain John Prasch and Chief Ed Hartin will complete the grant application based on the identified projects. More to follow on this at the board's regular meeting on February 20, 2024.

Captains Promotional Process: The assessment center was conducted on Tuesday, January 23rd with a single candidate, Temporary Captain Cody Sorensen. Thanks to Battalion Chief Brad Delano of the Camas Washougal Fire Department, Captain Tiffanie Rost and Captain Jeff Dana (ret.) of the Gresham Fire Department for their assistance as assessors. Captain Sorensen successfully completed the assessment process and will be promoted to the permanent rank of Captain effective February 16, 2024, and will be sworn in at the board's regular meeting on February 20, 2024.

Type One Engine Purchase: Captain John Prasch and Assistant Chief Robert Jacobs are traveling to the Rosenbauer manufacturing plant for the pre-construction meeting this week.

GFOA Distinguished Budget Presentation Award Program: The district's 2024 Adopted Budget has been submitted to the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) Distinguished Budget Presentation Award Program.

Full-Time Firefighter Recruitment: Firefighters David Lockwood (ECFR part-time firefighter) and Chris Miller (Depoe Bay, Oregon full-time firefighter) have completed all pre-hire requirements and have started work. Firefighter Lockwood has been assigned to C Shift and Firefighter Miller has been assigned to A Shift.

Part-Time Recruitment: Firefighters Carter Manley and Ethan Gilbert have completed all pre-hire requirements and have started work as part-time firefighters. They are currently completing their training and orientation.

Blue Card: The district's full-time firefighters have all completed the Blue Card on-line training program. The district is conducting two grant funded certification labs during the first two week ofs February.

ESO Records Management System: ESO is completing integration with the computer aided dispatch (CAD) system and end user training was completed in January. As such the district will miss our target of implementation by January 1st but should have the new records management system in place by the end of February.

Standard Operating Guidelines: Draft standard operating guidelines have been completed for hazmat carbon monoxide response, lithium-ion battery response, and member recognition. The purpose, scope, and policies for these SOGs have been submitted to the board for approval. SOGs on respectful workplace and anti-harassment have completed legal review and revision and will be provided to the board at their regular meeting on February 6, 2024, along with the SOG on reporting improper government action (which has only editorial change from the district's prior policy and procedure).

Update on Station 94

In my absence during the regularly scheduled Board of Fire Commissioners Meeting on February 6, 2024, I wanted to provide a status update on Station 94. As of 01/11/2024 the kitchen remodel was complete, and I performed a final walk-through. At that time the outstanding item requiring additional work by Paul Davis was some final plumbing on the water filtration system in the kitchen. Due to the ice and snow forecast for the next several days, we could not move personnel and equipment back to Station 94. In an effort to keep the pipes from freezing during the cold weather faucets were opened to keep water flowing through the plumbing at Station 94.

On January 16th I brought duty crews to Station 94 to ensure that the water was still running and make further preparations for staffing Station 94. At that time, we found a pipe in the west wall of the kitchen had burst. Water to the station was shut off and crews performed actions to reduce water damage. The pipe likely thawed and began flowing water on the morning of the 16th. Due to the quick recognition of the leak, further water damage was avoided. Paul Davis was contacted for water mitigation and repair of the burst pipe.

Over the subsequent days, Paul Davis performed water damage mitigation and repaired the plumbing in the kitchen. On January 30th plumbing repairs had been completed and a plumber from Paul Davis turned on Station 94's water to check the kitchen plumbing repairs. The plumber noted that water was leaking from the east wall of the storage closet and shut the water off. On January 31st the duty crews removed all furniture and supplies from the affected area along the east wall and in the following days Paul Davis repaired the leaking main line and performed water damage mitigation.

Paul Davis anticipates that Station 94 will be ready to be occupied in two weeks. During the next two weeks, I will coordinate with crews to facilitate the transition back to staffing Station 94. Leading up to the winter weather, improvements were made to Station 94's well housing to prevent pipes freezing at the pump. I believe that there are additional steps that could be taken to mitigate freezing pipes in the station during inclement weather in the future. One of the primary low-cost options is hot water recirculation, which allows warm water to flow back through the cold-water lines keeping the water lines above freezing. In the coming weeks, I intend to research the cost and viability of installing a water recirculation system at Station 94 as a means to overcome the issues related to building construction and plumbing at that facility.

Purpose

To establish a consistent program that will acknowledge and reward members of East County Fire and Rescue (ECFR) and our community partners.

Scope

This Standard Operating Guideline (SOG) applies to formal recognition of district members and community partners including medals, awards, citations, and letters of commendation.

Policy

It is the policy of ECFR to formally recognize members and community partners who provide exceptional service within the context of our values, mission, and vision.

Procedure

The following procedure will be used for informal and formal recognition of ECFR's members and our community partners:

Informal Recognition

Informal recognition can be provided by our members, members of partner agencies (e.g., Camas Washougal Fire Department, Vancouver Fire Department, Skamania County Fire District 4, Clark County Sheriff, Camas Police Department, Washougal Police Department) or from community members. There is no specific format for informal recognition as it often is in the form of an e-mail, a handwritten note, or a card. In other cases, it is simply a phone call to the fire chief or another member of the district's staff.

Upon receipt of informal recognition, the following steps will be taken:

- Forward the recognition to the accounting assistant/board secretary.
- If not identified in the recognition, identify which companies and members were involved in providing the service and append a note to the recognition identifying the members involved.
- Produce an electronic, portable document format (PDF) copy of the recognition (if the recognition was received by telephone, this information should be provided to the accounting

assistant/board secretary who will document the recognition in writing prior to production of the PDF copy.

Recognition will be shared with all members and the board of fire commissioners via e-mail.

Types of Awards

The ECFR recognition program includes the following types of awards. Awards to members (with the exception of Member of the Year) may also be given to members of partner public safety agencies (e.g., fire, emergency medical services, law enforcement) or members of the uniformed service (e.g., United States Navy, United States Coast Guard).

Medal of Valor: Awarded to a member who performs an act of extreme courage in a deliberate and calculated manner to save a human life under conditions which present a risk of imminent harm to both the civilian victim and the member. This action may not have been reckless and taken without due regard for safe and effective incident operations. The member's actions must have been witnessed by at least one other person who supported or substantial evidence regarding the authenticity of the act.

Distinguished Conduct Award: Awarded to any member who has acted with a high degree of integrity, compassion, professionalism, and/or equity during emergency operations when faced with specific danger, adversity, or significant challenge and has carried out their duties despite these conditions. This action may not have been reckless and taken without due regard for safe and effective incident operations. The member's actions must have been witnessed by at least one other person who supported or substantial evidence regarding the authenticity of the act.

Special Unit Citation: Awarded to any company or group of members who has distinguished themselves through a single event or for continued performance and dedication by the company or group as a whole.

Exceptional Service Award: Awarded to a member or group of members who distinguish themselves through selfless action that significantly benefits our community or the District. This award is typically given in recognition of a significant programmatic accomplishment.

Letter of Commendation: Awarded to a member or group of members in recognition of a significant accomplishment or contribution to our community or the District.

Community Awards: Awarded to citizens, businesses, organizations, and community groups whose efforts have resulted in saving lives, reduction of community risk, or benefiting the District. This includes, but is not limited to, recognition of community members who initiate cardiopulmonary resuscitation prior to the arrival of emergency medical responders.

Member of the Year: Awarded to a single member on an annual basis recognizing that member's commitment to the District's mission and vision, and consistency with the District's values of integrity, compassion, professionalism, and excellence.

Service Awards: Members shall be recognized for years of service in five year increments.

Recommendation

With the exception of member of the year and service awards, nominations for awards may be made by any member. Members shall submit nominations in writing to the fire chief. Nomination for member of the year will be made by the membership at large (with the exception of the fire chief) using a secret ballot. Members will select and rank order up to three individuals on the basis of commitment to the district's mission and vision, and consistency with the District's values of integrity, compassion, professionalism, and equity.

Approval of Awards

Special Unit Citation, Exceptional Service Award, Letter of Commendation, & Community Awards: Nominations of these awards will be reviewed by the fire chief who will make the final determination on the award.

Medal of Valor & Distinguished Conduct Award: Nominations for these awards will be reviewed by a panel appointed by the Fire Chief. This panel shall consist of a full-time member, part-time member, and volunteer, at least one of which must hold the rank of captain or above. This panel will investigate the circumstances surrounding the incident and the member's actions prior to making a recommendation to the fire chief for award or denial. The fire chief will submit the panel's recommendation and his endorsement or comment without endorsement to the board of fire commissioners who will make the final determination on awarding the medal or award.

Member of the Year: The accounting assistant/board secretary will tally the nominations for member of the year and submit the totals for each member nominated to the fire chief. The member receiving the most nominations shall be recommended to the board of fire commissioners as the member of the year. Should there be a tie in the number of nominations; the fire chief will cast the deciding vote. The fire chief will forward the recommendation and his endorsement or comment without endorsement to the board of fire commissioners who will make the final determination on the award.

Presentation of Awards

Awards will generally be presented at a regular or special meeting of the board of fire commissioners.

Display of Awards

Members receiving any award other than a letter of commendation will receive a medal and/or citation bar representing the award and a certificate outlining the circumstances and reason for the award along with a graphic representation of the related citation bar.

Medals or Citation Bars representing awards or Service Awards shall be worn on the recipient member's Class A uniform as specified in SOG 1.2.7 Uniform and Appearance (ECFR, 2024a)

Individuals recognized as the member of the year shall have their name affixed to a plaque displayed at the fire district headquarters station.

Companies or groups receiving a special unit citation will receive a plaque that shall be displayed at the station at which that group or company is assigned. Should the group be comprised of members from multiple stations, the unit citation shall be displayed at the station represented by the largest number of members or fire district headquarters station.

Purpose

Unintentional, non-fire-related Carbon Monoxide (CO) poisoning is responsible for many injuries and deaths in the United States each year. CO exposure may result from fires and malfunction or misuse of fuel burning appliances and equipment. Safe and effective response to this type of incident requires an understanding of the characteristics of carbon monoxide, its physiological effects, atmospheric monitoring, and mitigation procedures.

Scope

This Standard Operating Guideline (SOG) defines appropriate response to carbon monoxide alarms, where there has been or may be a release of carbon monoxide, and carbon monoxide poisoning.

Policies

ECFR has established the following policies related to carbon monoxide incidents:

- All carbon monoxide alarm activations shall be considered an indication of the presence of carbon monoxide unless atmospheric monitoring determines that no hazardous level of carbon monoxide is present.
- Incidents in which a medical patient is reported to have or exhibits the signs and symptoms of
 carbon monoxide poisoning shall be considered an indication of the presence of carbon
 monoxide until atmospheric monitoring determines that no hazardous level of carbon monoxide
 is present.
- In incidents involving carbon monoxide alarm activation or where an elevated level (>9 ppm) of carbon monoxide is detected, occupants shall be provided with an informational handout on the hazards of carbon monoxide and function of carbon monoxide alarms.
- Subject to the availability of funds, carbon monoxide alarms will be installed in owner occupied homes containing fuel burning appliances. In rental properties, loaner alarms will be provided, and the property owner advised of the requirement to install carbon monoxide alarms as required by RCW 19.27.530

Purpose

Lithium-ion (Li-ion) batteries are used in a variety of applications including power tools, e-mobility devices, vehicles, and energy storage systems. While these types of batteries provide an effective and efficient source of power, they may overheat, undergo thermal runaway, catch on fire, and even result in an explosion if damaged or improperly used, charged, or stored. Safe and effective response to incidents involving Li-ion batteries requires an understanding of their characteristics, how they react, and hazards presented when they are subjected to thermal and mechanical insult.

Scope

This Standard Operating Guideline (SOG) defines appropriate response to incidents involving Li-ion batteries.

Policies

ECFR has established the following policies related to Li-ion battery incidents:

- ECFR personnel shall maintain a high index of suspicion for the presence of Li-ion battery involvement when responding to vehicle and structure fires.
- When a hybrid or electric vehicle, energy storage system, or involvement of other Li-ion battery
 powered equipment is identified, this information will be communicated in the initial incident
 commander's (IC #1's) update report or a priority traffic message to command.
- Response to incidents involving Li-ion battery fires or batteries that have been subjected to
 mechanical or thermal insult will be addressed as a hazardous materials response as outlined in
 this guideline.

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Resolution #341-02062024

A resolution amending the district's 2024 operating budget.

WHEREAS, East County Fire and Rescue Board of Fire Commissioners endeavors to be fiscally responsible, operate with transparency, and ensure adequate and sustainable funding; and

WHEREAS, the board of fire commissioners has adopted the 2024 district budget in accordance with RCW 52.16.030; and

WHEREAS, Resolution #328-09192023 authorized transfer of \$50,000 from the equipment reserve fund to the general fund for purchase of personal protective equipment for new volunteer, part-time, and full-time firefighters; and

WHEREAS; Resolution #329-09192023 amended the district's operating budget to increase line item 522 20 38 000 turnouts by \$50,000 for purchase of personal protective equipment and authorized a purchase requisition for said personal protective equipment; and

WHEREAS, the vendor was unable to deliver the purchased personal protective equipment prior to the end of 2023 and as such the funds were not expended in 2023.

WHEREAS; delivery of the personal protective equipment and subsequent expenditure of funds was anticipated to occur in 2023, funds for this purchase were not included in the district's 2024 operating budget.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Fire Commissioners amend the district's 2024 operating budget by increasing line item 522 20 38 002 personal protective equipment by \$50,000 to provide funds for purchase of the personal protective equipment authorized and ordered in 2023 with this adjustment funded from the unappropriated balance of the general fund.

WHEREAS, the expense of disposal of the AFFF in district apparatus foam tanks and reserve of AFFF stored at Station 93 was unknown at the time the 2024 district operating budget was prepared;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Fire Commissioners transfers \$12,975 from general fund contingency to general fund line item 522 50 46 093 hazardous waste disposal to fund proper disposal of the district's complete stock of polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) containing aqueous film forming foam (AFFF) and other hazardous waste.

A special unit citation is awarded to any company or group of members who has distinguished themselves through a single event or for continued performance and dedication by the company or group as a whole.

On December 6, 2023 East County Fire and Rescue received a call directly from a resident at 3920 NE 246th Avenue for a flooding basement during a rain storm. Firefighter Ryan Grable, working out of class in the absence of a captain made the decision to respond to investigate the flooded basement and determine what action if any East County Fire and Rescue could take to mitigate the problem.

Arriving at the residence, Firefighters Grable, Dobbins, and Lockwood observed that the walk out basement of the home was flooded with approximately one inch of water and water was continuing to enter the basement from the exterior due to heavy rainfall. Unable to prevent water from entering the basement, Engine 91 remained in-service for other incidents, but remained on scene and assisted the residents in moving all of the furniture and other contents from the basement to the garage.

While this may seem like a small incident, the actions of Engine 91's crew were consistent with district's mission to reduce risk and exemplified our values of compassion and professionalism. Without Engine 91's assistance, the occupants of the residence would not have been able to move all of the furniture and contents from the basement and likely would have experienced a significant loss.
